Beowulf 5-10 Assessment

- 1. What does Hrothgar's speech inform us of and what might it signify overall?
- 2. Hrothgar seems very optimistic about Beowulf's chances for victory and is very respectful of Beowulf. Who is Unferth and how does he differ in his comments to and about Beowulf? Why might he be challenging Beowulf?
- 3. In reference to #2, how does Beowulf respond to this?
- 4. Define **foil**. How does Unferth serve as a **foil** to Beowulf? Provide **evidence from the text** to support your answer.
- 5. Welthow, Hrothagar's wife, exhibits many of the qualities valued in Anglo-Saxon women (she is beloved, generous, cheerful, gracious, etc.). Provide **evidence from the text** to support this claim.
- 6. In Part 7, when the pre-victory celebration ends and night has come, what does Hrothgar tell Beowulf? What might be the purpose of this?
- 7. How does the suspense built up in the beginning of Part 8 continue/increase the reader's anticipation/curiosity of the showdown between Beowulf and Grendel? When they battle, who is winning at the end of Part 8? Provide **evidence from the text** to support your answer.
- 8. How does the battle end?
- 9. How is Beowulf received after the battle by the crowds of people surrounding Herot?
- 10. How is the lake Grendel retreats to suggestive of Hell? Defend your answer with evidence from the text.
