**“Antigone”** by Sophocles

Characters: Creon, Antigone, Haemon, Ismene, Chorus, Tiresias, Sentry, Oedipus

- All elements of Greek drama: chorus, choragus, catharsis, tragic hero, tragic cycle, tragic flaw
- All elements of a medieval romantic hero

*Animal Farm* by George Orwell

Characters (and their allegorical counterparts) – Boxer, Clover, Benjamin, Moses, Napoleon, Snowball, Squealer, Major, Jones, Mollie, the dogs, the sheep

Types of Governments – capitalism, totalitarianism, communism

Parts of the Russian Revolution – proletariat, bourgeoisie, Karl Marx, Napoleon, Czar Nicolas II, Leon Trotsky

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**Rhetorical devices** – Hyperbole, Rhetorical Question, Allusion, Personification, Parallelism, Euphemism, Metaphor, Repetition

**Propaganda** – Bandwagon, Testimonial, Fear, Hasty Generalization

**Appeals** – Logos, Pathos, Ethos

**Logical Fallacies** – Red Herring, Circular Argument, Straw Man, Either/Or, Slippery Slope, Ad Hominem, Hasty Generalization

**Quotation Marks** – Rules of: ellipsis, brackets, punctuation introducing a quote, punctuation ending a quote, punctuation with the word “that”
