<u>COURSE REQUIREMENTS</u>: Both AP English IV and AP English IV for Dual Credit are college-level classes. On May 4, 2016, AP students will have the opportunity to earn college credit by taking the Advanced Placement Examination in English Literature and Composition. Students enrolled in dual credit through Texas Woman's University may earn college credit concurrently with their English IV credit by completing the requirements for ENG 2013 and ENG 2033. **Prerequisite:** for maximum success, it is recommended that the student should have completed English III Advanced Placement/IB in the 11th grade. Previous background of Pre-AP or honors /advanced English classes in grades 9-10 is advised.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

This course engages students in the careful reading and critical analysis of imaginative literature. Through the close reading of selected texts, students deepen their understanding of the ways writers use language to provide both meaning and pleasure for their readers. As they read, students consider a work's structure, style, themes, figurative language, imagery, symbolism, and tone. Ample opportunities will be provided for students to engage in class discussions. Emphasis is placed on clear verbal and written expression. Written products include the personal essay, literary analysis essay, comparative essay, poetry, précis, satire, and research paper.

Grading Policy

Major tests and assignments count 70%, and daily assignments count 30% of your final grade. Evaluation of your progress is through in-class and out-of-class writing assignments, annotations, vocabulary and content quizzes and tests on readings, and discussions.

Retests

Students have the opportunity for retest / reassessment <u>once</u> on each <u>major summative</u> assignment. It is the student's responsibility to show additional learning to gualify for reassessment.

Reassessment must be completed within 10 <u>school days</u> of grade being posted in HAC.

Late work has the same reassessment window of 10 days and does <u>not</u> receive additional time. Students should not expect late essays to be graded and returned immediately; therefore, students turning in

an essay more than 1 class day late may not have time to do the work to qualify for reassessment and reassess within the 10 day window.

Make-up, Late Work, and Absences

If you are on campus for any block on the due date, your work is due <u>that day</u>. For extracurricular absences, obtain your work ahead of time and remain on track with the class calendar. For illness or unplanned absence, you have one day to obtain the work and one more day to turn it in.

Tests scheduled for a day you are present <u>must be taken that day</u>, even if you were absent the day before. Keep apprised of the class calendar. Tests not made up promptly are late.
