Pertinent Classroom Information

- You must turn off or "silence/mute" all noise making devices before the start of class each day.
- Government is not a subject that can fully be appreciated without discussion and debate. There will be times when you disagree with me and/or your fellow classmates. It is OK to disagree. It is NOT acceptable to be disrespectful. If you don't know the difference, please ask (nicely).

- It is YOUR RESPONSIBILITY to insure you <u>SAVE</u> all assignment submissions on your "H" drive or keep them in your "Sent" folder in your email to prove your work.

Grading: Pursuant to Denton ISD's grading policy all grades for the course will be reflective of mastery of Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS). Students and parents may access the TEKS for U.S. Government on the Texas Education Agency's website (http://ritter.tea.state.tx.us/rules/tac/chapter113/ch113c.html).

Grades will be in one of two categories: major assessments minor assessments. Major assessments consist of tests, projects, written assignments, and presentations that are designed to evaluate understanding. There will be a minimum of 3 major assessments per nine weeks, with at least one major assessment per unit covered. Minor assessments will consist of developmental assignments that check for understanding of learning objectives; examples include quizzes, writing prompts, and classroom activities.

<u>Major Assessments:</u> 60% of final nine weeks grade <u>Minor Assessments:</u> 40% of final nine weeks grade

Reassessment: A student may opt to retake a major assessment within a 10 day window (school days only, not weekends and any absences will be included in the 10 day window) from the original grade posting of that assessment. This may be accomplished in the following ways:

- Teacher will set a deadline for reassessments to be completed within the 10 day window.
- Students will only have ONE additional attempt at showing mastery
- If you have failed to follow the directions stated on the Reassessment sheet, your original grade will stand in the Gradebook. (I.E. You failed to have the number of paragraphs necessary to answer the question properly.)
- Reassessment is worth full credit
- Major Assessments are the only grades that are eligible for "Re-Assessment".
