Suicide Prevention by Dragon's Lair Journalist Eloise Bourns

September is suicide prevention month. On Tuesday, September 18, Vianey Reinhardt, LPC spoke to our students about youth suicide prevention (as mandated by House Bill 1386). Mrs. Reinhardt is a Community Education Specialist with The Excel Center of Lewisville, TX. Her goal was to educate our students about potential warning signs. Excel Center of Lewisville is for at-risk youths. Here are a few key points from her presentation.

- Most common symptoms: regret, anxiety, irritability, self-isolation, loss of interest in favorite activities
- In the U.S. there are more deaths from suicide than from car accidents
- In people aged 15-35, suicide is the second leading cause of death
- 1 in 5 people have a mental illness. 50% of people show signs before 14 years old
- More teens and young adults die from suicide than from cancer
- There are 3,041 suicide attempts yearly in just teens in 9th to 12th grade. That's 912 daily
- 4 out of 5 people show warning signs
- Females are 3x more likely to attempt than males. Males complete 4x more than females
- Most at risk groups of youth;
 - 1. Native American/ Alaskan native youths
 - 2. Caucasian youths
 - 3. African-American youths
 - 4. Hispanic youths
- LGBTQ+ are more likely to attempt than straight youth

Who is at risk?: People who have previously attempted; Drug/ alcohol abusers; people with conduct and behavioral issues; people with non-supportive family; people with relationship conflicts; people with poor coping skills

What can I do?: Talk to an adult that you trust. Stay engaged with the at-risk person (maintain social connections, spend time together); Engage in healthy activities (limit screen time, exercise, eat healthy, encourage rest/ sleep); seek professional help.

Don't make a permanent decision your solution to a temporary problem.

Suicide is never the answer.

American Red Cross's Tips for Staying Safe

- ## Don't allow children to Trick or Treat alone. Older kids should take a friend and young children should be accompanied by an adult.
- ## Accompany children to the door of each house they approach.
- ## Familiarize yourself with every house you visit and all people from whom your children receive treats.
- # Tell kids NOT to enter any home without permission from parents or guardians.
- # Tell kids NOT to approach any vehicles, occupied or vacant, unless they are accompanied by a parent or quardian.
- ## Give children lights to carry -- like a glow stick or flashlight -- along with reflective clothing.
- Make sure that children can see and breathe properly and easily through facial masks.
- Warn children NEVER to approach any house that isn't well lit.
- Remind children to make note of suspicious incidents and report them to parents, guardians, and/or the proper official.
- Instruct children to run away, scream, and make a scene if anyone tries to grab or force them, in any way, to go with them.
