Ms. Schultz Retires - The End of an Era

Melinda Schultz started Ms. teaching at Fred Moore in January of 1991 when she was 29 years old. Now after 27 years, she is retiring. Her favorite thing about Fred Moore is the kids and they are who she will miss the most because they feel like family. What she will not miss is in-service days. After retirement, she's going into business for herself and looking forward to doing whatever, whenever she wants, which



includes spending more time with her parents and

traveling.

DL: What motivated you to become a teacher and why a history teacher specifically?

MS: I had ended up getting married, so we moved to Las Vegas, then we ended up going broke which caused us to move back to Denton. I started going to school and I needed some income, so I started subbing. In 1991 the superintendent, Ray Braswell, started this program for kids that were at risk. I knew Ray, and I knew his wife, so they asked me to come in and become a teacher.

DL: Has teaching given you a new outlook or perception on life?

MS: It keeps you young. I mean you're around kids all day long, you get to have all the new ideas that are going on, and it just keeps you young.

DL: How do you describe your experiences here at Fred Moore?

MS: It's been wonderful! It's the kids; It's always been about the kids.

DL: Throughout the years, how has Fred Moore changed?

MS: It started out on a grant that Ray Braswell wrote. The majority of the kids were pregnant in the program. In 1992, the building was renovated and the name changed to Fred Moore Learning Center to serve more kids in different situations.

DL: Do you think it's important for the teacher to keep a good relationship with their students?

MS: You have to start out with respect. If you don't have





Outsmart Germs for a Healthy Holiday

How Germs Spread

The main way that illnesses like colds and flu are spread is from person to person in respiratory droplets of coughs and sneezes. This can happen when droplets from a cough or sneeze of an infected person move through the air and are deposited on the mouth or nose of people nearby. Germs are also spread when a person touches respiratory droplets from another person on a surface like a desk and then touches his or her own eyes, mouth or nose. Viruses and bacteria can live 2 hours or longer on surfaces like tables, doorknobs, and desks.

How to Stop the Spread of Germs

- Cough or sneeze into a tissue and then throw it away or cough into your sleeve.
- Try to keep your hands away from your face. Wash your hands frequently.
- Sing the ABC song while you wash your hands. When you wash your hands use soap, warm water and wash for 15 to 20 seconds.
- When soap and water are not available, use alcohol-based disposable hand wipes or gel sanitizers. Rub your hands until the gel is dry. The alcohol in the gel will kill germs.





On October 29th, 15 of our Interact members, their friends and family, as well as one Guyer High School student joined the Rotarians, and Rise Against Hunger members to pack food (dried vegetables, soy protein pieces, rice, and nutritional packets) into small plastic bags. There were three different sections with their own individual tasks; the first group was responsible for putting the food in the bags, which would then be passed to the second group, who were equipped with heat-seal presses. Finally, the bags would be placed in cardboard boxes to be prepared to be

shipped to their final destination(s). Every time the last group would box 1,000 bags, one of the Rise Against Hunger members would ring the gong set up at the back of the gym. Next to that gong was a table with samples of the food that we were packing, 'Rise Against Hunger' bracelets, pens, and pins, and cardboard fans. In addition to that, there was a cardboard "Rise Against Hunger" stand with a selfie frame. At the end of the event, we had a total of 10,153 bags packed, far exceeding our goal. Thank you to everyone who attended to help us!
