Dr. W.E. ("Elmo") Penley, (1924-2002), was a dentist and orthodontist who was active in

the Denton community for almost 50 years. He served on the DISD Board from 1967

to 1975, He was reared in Greer County, Oklahoma during the Dust Bowl era, and

graduated from Mangum, Okla. High School in 1942. He volunteered for and served in

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the Navy as a signalman in the Pacific Theater in World War II. After receiving an Honorable Discharge, he used the GI Bill and attended the University of Oklahoma in 1946-47. He transferred to Baylor University, where he majored in chemistry and graduated in 1950. He then attended Baylor College of Dentistry in Dallas and received a DDS degree in 1953. He and his wife, Nelwyn A. Penley, moved to Denton in August, 1953 and purchased a dental practice. From 1960-62, he trained in orthodontics at the Univ. of Texas Dental Branch in Houston. Following graduation, he returned and opened the first practice dedicated to orthodontics in Denton. He retired in 2001. In addition to his service on the DISD Board, he was active in other community organizations. He was a member of the Denton Kiwanis Club for 46 years, and served as its President in 1969. He was a Board Member and Treasurer of the Denton Chamber of Commerce. He was Vice-President of the Texas Dental Association and President of the Denton County Dental Society. He helped establish the Denton YMCA and served as a Board member. He treated residents of the Denton State School. As a dentist and orthodontist, Dr. Penley treated several generations of Denton school students. He took a strong interest in their plans for the future, and was a positive role model and great encourager. He also supported continuing education opportunities in Denton.

#### 4. REASONS FOR NOMINATION

Dr. Penley served on the DISD School Board from 1967 to 1975, a time a tremendous

growth in DISD. He possessed a clear vision for the future needs of the district.

He was a strong supporter of educational opportunities for students of all

backgrounds and abilities, and believed that a sound education was the foundation

for a person's adult life. He was on the Board during the period when Denton's schools

were racially integrated and believed in fair treatment and equal opportunities for all

students. He was also involved in planning for the future growth of the district, and par-

ticipated in decisions to select and purchase property for new schools. During his ten

ure on the Board, Strickland Junior High was constructed and opened, and the old Den-

ton Junior High was remodeled and renamed Congress Junior High. He favored the

adoption of additional sports programs, such as soccer, so more students could par-

ticipate in athletics. He was a staunch believer in the value of vocational education programs.
