Grade Point Average

GPA will be calculated for the foundation courses as follows:

- 4 Language Arts courses
- 4 Science courses (1 each/Biology, Chemistry, Physics, and 1 additional course)
- 4 Social Studies courses
- 4 Math courses (highest 8 semesters)
- 2 World Language (highest 4 semesters of same course)

GPA foundation courses will be calculated whether the student took the class during the regular school year, in summer school, by correspondence, by course exam, or by dual enrollment.

GPA and rank are calculated on a 4-point scale with a 1-point bonus for IB, Honors, AP, and Dual credit classes. Only 18 (36 semesters) academic foundation courses are used in the calculation. Only courses taken during 9th through 12th grade will be computed in a student's GPA. Earned GPA from courses completed within the prescribed 18 is used to rank students through the 6th & 7th semesters. Highest GPA in present senior class is 5.0.

The School

Description: A public comprehensive four-year secondary school offering programs in college preparatory, career & technology, english as a second language, & special education.

Enrollment: Total of 2040 students, with a senior class of 457.

Demographics: Hispanic or Latino 34%, American Indian & Alaska Native 1%, Asian 3%, Black or African American 16%, Native Hawaiian & other Pacific Islander 1%, White 45%.

School Day: Total of eight credit-earning classes; six classes of 90-minutes each in length-meeting on alternate days, and two classes of 60-minutes each in length-meeting every day (officially referred to as a modified block schedule).

Accreditation: Fully granted by the Texas Education Agency and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Faculty: The faculty consists of 242 professional staff members, including a principal, one associate principal and five instructional principals, five counselors, one career counselor, one student assistance counselor and one social worker. More than 45% of the faculty hold advanced degrees.

PSAT/NMSQT and Online SAT Readiness:

This is a district funded program to help students improve test taking skills. It includes free PSAT/NMSQT testing for 10th and 11th grade students and free online SAT readiness courses for students grades 9-12.

Dual/Concurrent Enrollment Courses: Available through the University of North Texas, Texas Woman's University and North Central Texas College; college math, economics, history, chemistry, and english classes. These classes are also available on campus. www.dentonisd.org/page/71472

Articulated College Credit Opportunities: Students can earn free college credit at DHS and the Advanced Technology Complex in courses which are articulated with community colleges.

The International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme

The IB Diploma Programme is a challenging twoyear course of study designed to meet the needs of highly motivated and talented high school students. It provides students with the intellectual, social, and critical perspective necessary for the international world. Texas Senate Bill 111 (2005) awards Texas seniors earning the IB Diploma with scores of 4 or better a total of 24 semester credit hours at any Texas public institution of higher education.

In 2019, DHS had 21 full Diploma candidates completing a total of 318 subject exams.

General Information

Denton ISD: 'A fast-growing community'

Located at the top of the "golden triangle" of the Dallas-Fort Worth area, Denton ISD is the second-fastest growing school district in North Texas. Denton's unique "small town community" environment separates it from the growing, larger suburban school districts within the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex.

With two universities and a community college— University of North Texas, Texas Woman's University, and North Central Texas College—within its boundaries, Denton ISD is able to offer the highest quality academic programs. However, it maintains a small-school climate so students can develop stronger leadership skills.

The goal of the district is to keep its high schools at maximum enrollment of 2,000. In 2006, the district opened a state-of-the-art LaGrone Advanced Technology Complex for juniors and seniors. In 2016, Denton ISD opened its fourth comprehensive high school.

Denton ISD encompasses 180 square miles and is part of 15 cities and communities. The community support is vital to students as they prepare for life post-high school.

Curriculum

The graduation requirement at Denton High is 26 credits (See chart below).

Students must also pass a state proficiency examination (EOC) in English I & II, Algebra I, Biology, and US History to receive a diploma. Identified gifted students are served in high school through advanced coursework options.
