Of the 212 families that were enrolled, 96 were two-parent families. 169 had a family income below 100% of the federal poverty level. 11 received public assistance such as SSI, or TANF. 3 were in foster care, 10 were homeless, 0% were between 100% - 130% of the federal poverty level and 0% were over-income as allowed by law.

Because of a budget shortfall, we reduced the teaching staff for 2015-16 by 2 while retaining our funded enrollment of 193. This then gave us a little extra to purchase window shades to fulfill the Head Start requirement of fire retardant window coverings and we also purchased an additional iPad for each classroom.

HEALTHY CHILDREN

Each child is required to have a physical and dental exam within 90 days of enrollment in the Head Start Program. Good health is critical in a child's development. Our campus has a full time Registered Nurse (RN) who also serves as the Head Start Health Specialist. The RN ensures that each child has received regular dental and physical exams and meets the needs of students with acute and chronic health needs. During the 2015-2016 school year, health screening including hearing, vision, height and weight were performed on each Head Start Student.





Disabilities and Mental Health Services

During the 2015-16 school year the Denton ISD Head Start Program began the year with 15 students identified as eligible for special education services. An additional 13 students were added with a total of 25 students receiving special education intervention through services provided by the district.



The Disabilities Specialist implemented the procedure of completing the district's Universal Screener Report immediately after scoring the DIAL-4 used as the required screener. Information was also gathered from a review of the Ages and Stages Questionnaire 3rd Edition and the Disabilities Information Form. Both of the forms were completed by parents during Round-Up. A licensed specialist in School Psychology provides services to those students eligible for special education services identified with a need through the IEP process.

Mental Health Services continue to be provided by the district with the district providing a licensed professional counselor two and one-half-days a week. Among the duties of the counselor are the provision of class lessons related to targeted character traits. The program continues to work with the University of North Texas to provide Play Therapy to students who demonstrate a need.
