#### DHS International Relations 101-GAPP

The German American Partnership Program is a school-toschool exchange sponsored by the Federal Republic of Germany's Ministry of Culture and the U.S. Department of State. Denton High School has a partnership with the *Nicolaus-Kopernikus-Gymnasium* (college-prep high school) in *Weissenhorn*, Germany. Every other summer, DHS students, accompanied by the German teacher, Frau Dieckman, travel to Germany for a three-week visit to this community and one additional week spent traveling to the capital and other parts of the country. Their partners from Germany visit Denton around Easter every other year.

GAPP brings together American and German students who are studying each other's languages and cultures. The most important feature of the program is that students live in the homes of peers while visiting the partner country. They get to know their partners in the most meaningful way possible: by sharing their daily lives, getting to know their families, attending their schools and experiencing their culture firsthand. The basic premise behind the program is not sightseeing and souvenir buying, but rather fostering both dialogue and friendship between young people. GAPP will result in increased German language skills which translate into more career opportunities and a broadened way of viewing the world, as well as lasting friendships.

In late March through early April the DHS student body will have the opportunity to 'meet the world' as approximately twenty DHS students host their partners from Weissenhorn, Germany. These students will be part of their families and the school community for those three weeks. In June, several DHS students will serve as our ambassadors as they travel to Germany.

#### **Board Commends IBO Program**

Students and staff involved in the IBO program at the district's three IBO schools – gave the board an update on the program. Last spring, Denton High was authorized as an IB school. Calhoun Middle and Newton Rayzor Elementary are working on becoming approved IB schools.

Several students involved in the program spoke to the board. "I'm a Thinker. When I might try to ask the teacher a question and instead the answer just pops into my head," said Korigan Born, Newton Rayzor student.

Mia Price, board secretary, said members of the community are talking – and are very excited about this being part of Denton ISD.

Dr. Harris said it was important to target middle school students to get them involved and wanted to see the program grow with 25 to 30 students in the program next year. (This year there are 10 students in the first-year program at Denton High.)

Dr. Jim Alexander said IB was one of the most exciting programs to occur in the schools. "I am delighted with the progress you have made. At first, I was concerned about the number of students – but realized this is the first group. What we're really doing here – is building a new learning environment across our district."

"We are one step away from going 'global' and congratulations," said Charles Stafford, board president.





The Pride of Bronco Country has been back since July  $30^{th}$ . The student band leadership and directors met on July  $30^{th}$  to review last

year, decide what they want and need to do this year, clean the band hall and generally get ready for the new marching season. With the loss through graduation of 22 seniors and the addition of 22 new freshmen, hopes are high for another successful marching season. Full practices started on August 4<sup>th</sup> at 8:30 a.m. with a full day's schedule of marching & playing.

On Saturday, October 4<sup>th</sup>, the 5<sup>th</sup> annual Golden Triangle Marching Classic (hosted by the DHS band) will start a full day's worth of marching band competition in the C.H. Collins Athletic Complex at 8:30 a.m. Finals begin at 6:00 p.m. Come out and watch 21 area and regional bands compete or just come and watch the DHS band provide their marching program as an exhibition.

The DHS Band competition season is coming soon. Their first competition is October 11<sup>th</sup> at Birdville, followed on the 18<sup>th</sup> by the Regional, and then they close their competition season at Frisco Centennial on November 1, 2008 and play their last regularly scheduled game at Little Elm on November 7th.

#### Expectations for the New School Year

The new school year always brings a lot of change. Will your teen like her teachers and vice versa? Will he finally get up when the alarm rings? Will she make new friends but keep the old? Will he go through tough times when he realizes he's not the best at something he excelled in last year? Will she get involved in several (but not too many) after-school activities?

It's not unusual for parents to want to start fresh when the new school year begins, and to make a lot of rules and regulations to make up for the looseness of summer routines. But it's hard for everyone to get into the structure that school schedules impose. So... best to be flexible and ease into it gradually.

1. Schedules. Hopefully, you will have encouraged your kids to get to bed and getting up at reasonable hours about two weeks before school starts. If not, this is the time to do it. Make sure they are really going to bed, not just hanging out in their room on the computer with an i-Pod in their ear! 2. Logistics. Start thinking about how to get your teens from here to there and make sure they eat and get their work done too? If carpooling is a challenge in your household, make sure you have friends or neighbors who can help out. As we all try to drive less, it's important to consolidate activities.

3. Homework. These days, tweens and teens are loaded up with homework in every subject area from the first days of school. How do they stay on top of it?

• Get the lay of the land on the types of assignments each child has (reading, essays, math drills, science projects, vocabulary and grammar for foreign languages, preparation for pop quizzes, or long-term research projects.) Learn what your kids are expected to turn in and when.

Have your kids make a master list of when all their assignments are due and keep it up to date. They should keep a copy in their organizer.
Set a flexible time period for getting daily and weekly homework done,

maneuvering around extra-curricular and family activities.

Check in with your kids several times a week, especially at the beginning of the semester, to be sure they're getting their work done.
Chores. If you have had a regular drill for garbage, pet duty, cleaning rooms, etc., over the summer, congratulations! If not, it's time to parcel out the chores and get everyone back in the swing of helping out.
Family dinners. Be sure to eat together as a family as much as you can,

and make a plan to continue this throughout the school year. Teens who eat with their families. are shown to avoid risk-taking behaviors such as smoking, drinking and early sexuality more than their peers who don't have regular family meals.

#### School Nurse News – Flu Facts

F: Fever spike (up to 103°) A: Aches C: Chills T: Tiredness

S: Sudden symptom onset

A cold tends to creep up on you little-by-little. The three most frequent cold symptoms are nasal stuffiness, sneezing and sore throat. And, while your child might not feel 100 percent, if armed with enough tissues, he/she can still pursue most daily activities. A cold usually lasts for five to seven days, and when it's over, it's over.

The flu, on the other hand, strikes hard and fast, often with debilitating exhaustion. Flu usually makes you and your loved ones too sick and weak to go to work, school or even leave the bed. After most flu symptoms have passed, fatigue can still linger, making you feel miserable for two weeks or more. The flu can also lead to other serious complications, such as pneumonia and dehydration. Additionally, the virus can aggravate existing health conditions like asthma and diabetes, which affect many children.

Following is a simple symptom checklist to help you distinguish between cold and flu symptoms. And remember, children who come down with the flu may have additional symptoms that are uncommon in adults, including ear infections, diarrhea, vomiting or nausea.

SYMPTOMS	COLD	FLU
Cough	Hacking, productive cough	Dry, unproductive cough
Fever (usually high, 101°+)	Rarely	Yes
Muscle and body aches	Slight	Severe
Severe fatigue/weakness	Slight fatigue	Yes
Headache	Rarely	Yes
Stuffy nose	Yes	Rarely
Sneezing	Yes	Rarely
Sore throat	Yes	Rarely
Sudden symptoms	Appear gradually	Can appear within 3 to 6 hours

- has flu-like symptoms or the symptoms worsen.
- has a high temperature for more than a few days.
- appears especially irritable or less responsive than usual.
- seems to get better, but then quickly feels worse again.

#### DHS an International Baccalaureate World School

Denton High School is officially an IB World School! This

allows Denton High School to offer the two year Diploma Programme set of classes to the first cadre of IB Diploma Candidates. These IB Diploma Programme Candidates are risk taking trailblazers, setting the stage not only for their own successful futures, but of future IB Diploma Candidates. The IB



classes include classes in English, a world language, history, math, science, fine arts and/or electives and Theory of Knowledge. The IB classes are designed to develop content knowledge and academic skills over the students' junior and senior years in preparation for external tests in the spring of their senior year. Students earning the official IB Diploma, as a result of external test scores, can receive a minimum of 24 hours of college credit if they choose to attend a state supported college or university.

While Diploma Programme Candidates are busy in their current classes they have also been busy supporting the Denton High School community. DP Candidates have been working on their Creativity, Action and Services hours, which are an integral component of the Diploma Programme. They have assisted with Fish Camp, provided tours for new students, assisted with registration and the distribution of school supplies as well as placing IB Learner Profile stickers in all DHS student agendas. Student involvements in extracurricular activities are also helping students accumulate CAS hours. Current DP Candidates are involved in DHS basketball and tennis teams, band, and orchestra. Students are also planning long term CAS projects that will allow them to earn future service hours.

While the IB Diploma Programme is officially IB Authorized, the IB Middle Years Programme (DHS in partnership with Calhoun Middle School) is working to become IB MYP Authorized. The IB MYP Application B will be filed with International Baccalaureate in November, 2008. Teachers at both CMS and DHS are working to develop MYP class outlines and units of study that promote inquiry based learning and problem solving skills.
