2. Minimum core grade point average.
3. Minimum ACT/SAT test scores.
4. Completion of core courses.

SAT & ACT TEST



- *What score must I make on the SAT or ACT to qualify ?*
- The minimum score will vary according to your **CORE GPA** in correlation with the **sliding scale**.
 - *Sliding Scale explained later



SAT & ACT TESTS



- **When should I take the test?**

- You should begin taking the test during the spring of your junior year.

- **How many times can I take the test?**

- The test can be taken as many times as one desires.



SAT TEST

- Four-hour test that measures verbal and mathematical reasoning skills.
- Score will be 200-800 for each section.
- For athletic purposes they will only use the math & verbal sections to determine qualification.



ACT TEST

- Four-hour curriculum test that consists of 4 sections: Reading, English, Science and Math.
- Tests information that you have learned throughout your high school career.
- Scores will range from 1 to 36.



SAT & ACT TESTS



- *Is it possible to interchange scores on the SAT to qualify for NCAA?*
 - **YES.** One can interchange a math or verbal score from one test to another to accumulate the highest possible score.
- *This does not apply to regular college admission requirements.

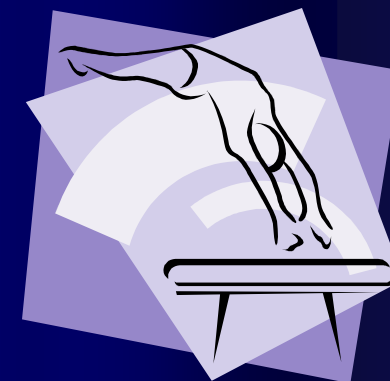


Interchanging Your Test Scores



SAT	Math	Verbal	Total Score
SAT 10/03	350	470	820
SAT 12/03	420	440	860
Scores used	420	470	890

ACT	Math	Science	English	Reading	Composite
ACT 10/03	13	16	13	17	14
ACT 12/03	17	14	18	16	16
Scores used	17	16	18	17	17

Initial Eligibility Requirement for DIV I-IA 2008 and After

16 Core Courses

- 4 years of English
- 3 years of Math (Algebra I or higher)
- 2 years of Science (one must be a lab)
- 1 year of additional English, Math or Science
- 2 years of Social Studies
- 4 years of additional core-course units (any above or foreign language)



Initial Eligibility Requirements Division II

14 Core Courses

- 3 years of English
- 2 years of Math (Algebra I or higher)
- 2 years of Science (one must be a lab)
- 2 years of additional English, Math or Science
- 2 years of Social Studies
- 3 years of additional core-course units (from any area above or foreign language)



NCAA Requirements Div I & I-AA



- 16 Core Courses
- Sliding Scale using either your SAT or ACT score in conjunction with your GPA.
 - Combine SAT Scores For Reading & Math only. *Writing section is not used.
 - Sum of the 4 sections of the ACT.



NCAA Requirements Div. II



- 14 Core Courses
- Minimum SAT Score of 820.
- Minimum ACT sum Score of 68.
- Div II **does not** use a sliding scale.



NCAA Requirements

SLIDING SCALE

The sliding scale is a combination of *CORE GPA*
& SAT OR ACT SCORES.



Division I Sliding Scale Example



This is an abbreviated version of the index.

<u>GPA</u> *core classes only	<u>SAT</u>	<u>ACT</u>
2.500	820 *2 Sections	68 *sum of all 4
2.300	900 *2 Sections	75 *sum of all 4
2.000	1010 *2 Sections	86 *sum of all 4

What is the Eligibility Center?



The NCAA Eligibility Center evaluates your academic record to determine if you are eligible to participate in a Division I or II college as a freshman student athlete.



Who Needs to Register With the Eligibility Center?

A student who plans to attend an NCAA
Division I or II institution
and
who wishes to participate in
intercollegiate athletics.



When Should a Student Athlete Register?



Register online at the **end of the junior year.**

The Eligibility Center will not process a transcript with **fewer than six semesters represented.**

How to Register for the NCAA Eligibility Center

- Go to www.ncaaclearinghouse.net.
- Follow directions to set up an account and to register.



How To Submit Official Transcripts to The NCAA Eligibility Center

- Register at www.ncaaclearinghouse.net.
- Request two official transcript release forms from the **Counseling Office at Guyer.**
- Bring completed release forms, one stamped envelope, and \$2 to Mrs. Arrington.
- Mrs. Carbonaro will mail the transcripts at the appropriate times.

Player's Role in Recruiting



- The team's success attributes to your success

- Recruiting calls
 - Plan conversation
 - Have backup plan
 - Be prepared to ask questions

The Coach's Role

- Academics
 - Grade Check System
- Publicity
 - Send athletic information about athletes to every university in the United States
- Recruiting Profile Sheet



The Coach's Role

- Provides universities with highlight video on every senior who wishes to try and compete at the next level
- Official college visits
 - Organize and schedule personal visits to universities.



GHS Transcript Release Forms



- A GHS Transcript Release Form is also helpful to have on file for any scout that would like to look at his or her transcript and film.
- This must be signed by the athlete and parent and kept in the fieldhouse.
